Therapeutic assessment offers a collaborative, person-centered approach that benefits clients across various settings. However, logistical challenges, such as time constraints and billing, often hinder its full implementation, particularly in fast-paced environments like hospitals and primary or integrated care settings. Ironically, these settings often have the greatest need for therapeutic assessments, especially for vulnerable clients, including those on the Autism spectrum, with executive functioning challenges, learning differences, or other forms of neurodivergence.

This workshop will address the challenges of applying therapeutic assessment in fast-paced settings, explore streamlined methods that preserve its core principles, and emphasize strategies particularly beneficial for neurodiverse clients. Through role play and clinical case consultations, participants will learn to apply these principles effectively in real-world scenarios.
